#### **Wyomissing Area Participates in Model Senate**



Students in Mr. Kersikoski's AP United States Government and Politics class were given the opportunity to join Senator Judith Schwank on the floor of the Senate in Harrisburg to brainstorm and produce bills as "Model Senators". Juniors Olivia Tipton, Cadence Hoke, Nate Torres, and Ian Levering participated in the program during which they were assigned parties and committees, such as education, workforce, and medicine. Similar to Model United Nations, these students were asked to act like senators, sitting in on committees and caucus meetings, along with electing a governor. Governmental lobbyists and experts from Harrisburg sat in on these sessions and answered questions for our mock senators enriching the learning experience. Working with many other students from around the county, our Wyomissing Area

students learned about the process of amending and changing bills to make them more beneficial after participating in the debate.

Following the initial meetings and preparation, our students were geared up with information about making and signing legislation and were ready to take it to the capital, Harrisburg. Senator Schwank provided students with a tour of the capitol building during which our Spartans bumped into Lieutenant Governor John Federman who welcomed them and answered additional questions. Following these introductions, the students were then brought to the floor of the senate to sit in the balconies. Our students proudly and confidently argued and voted on their bills as if they were being processed through the Senate. This being Wyomissing Area's first time participating in Model Senate, Mr. K is hoping to keep joining, if invited, to provide this opportunity for more of his students.

#### Students at WREC Create Student Newspaper



A group of gifted students at the West Reading Elementary Center began working on a school newspaper earlier in the year. With the help of many peers and teacher Mrs. Easteadt, the students successfully published a student-run newspaper. Earlier this year, students participated in a kindness project for SPARK which, in turn, sparked the idea to start a student-led school newspaper to highlight events happening at WREC. Aubrey Maryniak, Bella Karchevsky, Olivia Epler, Naomi Wert, and William Combs were a few students who took the initial lead on starting the paper. They began by drafting what the paper could look like, and giving it a name; West Reading Writers. As the students began to plan their visions of what the newspaper would be, they recruited more students along the way including some fifth-grade students with the hopes of training them to take over next year when the sixthgraders move up to the high school. Each edition of the newspaper features a comic section created by the students, a culture corner highlighting cultural holidays happening throughout the month, a game of the month, and two to three articles relating to school events. The students, who call themselves the "News Crew" work to divide up the workload to keep themselves organized. Some of the jobs each student could take on are: editor, article writer, interviewer, google form organizer, comic creator, and culture researcher and writer. Most of the students working to create the newspaper find the comics and story writing to be the most interesting. While this group features many different students, the core group of five students did not expect the paper to take off the way that it did. The "News Crew" found themselves also planning school-wide events such as dodgeball tournaments, march madness competitions, and mini bowl as a recreation of the super bowl. The students will be putting out their last edition for June with the hopes of having a section of "wish lists" for the fifth graders from the sixth graders. Through this opportunity, the students have learned how to work together, stay organized, developed interview skills, enhancing their public speaking skills, and many other valuable lessons that they will carry with them.



Students at the West Reading Elementary Center have been working on service projects all year. In the beginning of the year, students Anthony DeNada, Andrew Boeger, and Max Strock wanted to find a service project that would benefit the community. After a lot of consideration, they had decided that a bench to play outside of the school was the best option. Before deciding on the bench itself, the students worked to brainstorm fundraising ideas to cover the cost. After brainstorming many options, the students reached out to WAEF to pursue a grant to fund the new bench. The students, along with the help of Mrs. Easteadt, filled out the grant application and pitched their idea to the WAEF committee, who then approved the grant allowing the students to continue with the service project. Students researched what kind of bench to get, specific pricing, and how to make a plaque for the bench thanking WAEF for their generosity. When the bench arrived the students helped to assemble it and had the opportunity to visit the STEAM labs at the high school to laser print the plaque. #### **Spartan Service Project at WHEC**



Fourth-grade students at WHEC worked throughout the months of March and April to provide for an organization in need. Spartan Melanie Leshner is extremely passionate about dogs. especially after adopting her own dog from To Love A Canine Rescue. She became interested in learning more about the organization and the process of rescuing dogs after experiencing it herself. Melanie also was interested in learning ways to help the adoption league and the dogs that are housed there. After conducting research with the help of her family and teachers, Melanie was able to compile a list of the needs of To Love A Canine Rescue to determine how to help in the most effective way. After careful work on her own, Melanie found another student in fourth grade who shared the same interest and passion for animals, especially dogs and partnered with Kayla Moore for the next phase of the process. The two students decided that the most effective way to help the league would be to have a two-weeklong donation drive at WHEC. To maximize their efforts in collecting donations, Melanie and Kayla worked together to create posters to hang throughout the school, decorated donation boxes, kept inventory of the donations, and shared facts each day on the morning announcements to remind the students and staff in the building why they were participating in the drive. Families, students, and staff throughout the building were able to collect over three large bins of items to donate. Some of the collected items included: dog food, treats, toys, leashes, and cleaning supplies. Melanie and Kayla were able to learn a lot through their service project efforts such as organization, advertising, bravery, and determination. To Love A Canine Rescue was overjoyed with the number of donations the students at WHEC were able to collect and were extremely grateful for the girls' effort. #### International Opportunities with Mrs. Gibson's Fourth-Grade Class

Fourth-grade students in Mrs. Gibson's class read a book called <u>Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes</u>. The book tells the story of a girl named Sadako Sasaki, who was two years old when the United States dropped the atom bomb on Hiroshima. As a result of the radiation from the bomb, she developed leukemia and died when she was 12 years old. The Children's Peace Monument was built in Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park in honor of Sadako and others who died as a result of the atom bomb.

In Japan, there is a legend that anyone who folds 1,000 origami cranes will be granted a wish. Before her death, Sadako folded over 1,000 cranes in the hopes that she would get better. Today, people from all over the world send strings of 1,000 cranes to be placed in Peace Park at the Children's Peace Monument. Students in Mrs. Gibson's class decided to fold 1,000 cranes of their own to send to Japan as a wish for peace, and mailed their cranes to Chinobu Takami, the vice principal at Hiroshima Jogakuin Senior High School. The students in Japan took the cranes to Peace Park on our behalf. Our Spartans also decided to participate in the Peace Crane Project (peacecraneproject.org) during which they each signed a pledge for peace and folded an origami crane with messages of peace on its wings, which they sent, along with some information about themselves, to a class of third-graders at Nicolae lorga School in Romania. The students in Romania also sent our Spartans cranes and some information about themselves in return.

Finally, as a culmination to the book and a celebration of their hard work folding cranes, Mrs. Gibson set up a Japanese restaurant for the students, where they were able to sample some of Sadako's favorite foods: miso soup, chicken and rice, an egg roll, and bean cakes, along with tea. This special project provided students an opportunity to connect with other leaders around the world to expand their study of important themes.

#### **Read Across America**

Students at WHEC met the goal of their reading challenge! The school-wide goal was to collectively read 248,000 minutes during the month of March and THEY DID IT! To celebrate their success and dedication to reading, they voted on a reward and sent Mrs. DeRenzo and Dr. K to the roof for the day! 
